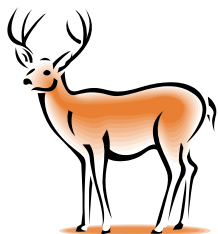

MASS WILDLIFE ADVISORY CWD FOUND IN PENNSYLVANIA

Hunters are reminded that whole deer may not be imported into MA from CWD-positive jurisdictions. With the recent confirmation of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) in a Pennsylvania deer, the Division of Fisheries and Wildlife (MassWildlife) is reminding hunters of the ban on importing intact deer carcasses from CWD-positive jurisdictions such as Pennsylvania and New York, into Massachusetts. Worcester County League - Craig Cortis

The October League meeting was held 10/19/12 at NORCO Sportsman's Club. I was unable to attend due to a prior commitment and will try to briefly report on the meeting in the next newsletter. Many of you will read this before the Nov. 6 election. Those of you who'll vote will cast your votes for candidates of your own choosing, obviously as is your right. We also have the right not to vote at all, even if registered to vote – I'm certainly not telling you anything new here. I won't use up space recounting example of razor-thin election results that would've turned out differently if just a handful (literally) of people had chosen to actually vote instead of staying home. What about the occasional recounts we hear about? There are numerous cases every few years around this country in which a candidate was reported to have initially won an election by fewer than 10 votes, even by 1 or 2 votes in some instances. So, votes don't count? Sure, you might dislike each candidate in a contested election but chances are better than even that, deep down, you'll dislike one candidate at least a little more than his or her opposition, and in the end someone's going to win, whether you approve of the whole process or not. An account of a recent election as reported in the October issue of The GOAL News was almost unbelievable to me. Due to a state representative's decision to resign his seat so that he could take a job in the judicial system, the 3rd Berkshire District was left with a vacancy in the Mass House. A special election was held for the open seat; at least 4 candidates were on the ballot, including 1 from each of the 2 major parties. A combination of the usual apathy among citizens and the fact that this was a "special" election that didn't coincide with the normal election cycle resulted in a 24% turnout of registered voters in the 3rd Berkshire District, a number which doesn't surprise me. The thing that bothers me most is the shockingly low turnout of voters in that district who are registered as members of 1 of the 2 major political parties – only 10% of them actually voted. (Their candidate came in last.) This pretty much says it all, I think. How many times have you heard people who didn't vote admit that they nonetheless would have preferred so-and-so had won instead of the person who actually did win? It happens every time. You may not like any of the candidates running for various offices, but you won't help the one you dislike the least by not voting. Remember, every contested office on a ballot will be won by someone even without your participation, and that person will therefore exercise a degree of power over non-voters and voters alike – it's that simple. Do you believe that you stand on some noble principle by refusing to take part in a process you regard to be hopelessly corrupted and broken-down? The winners won't care about your notions. They'll just be thankful for the voters who put them over the top. The next W.C.L. meeting is 11/16/12 at Harvard Sportsman's Club, 7:30 p.m.
